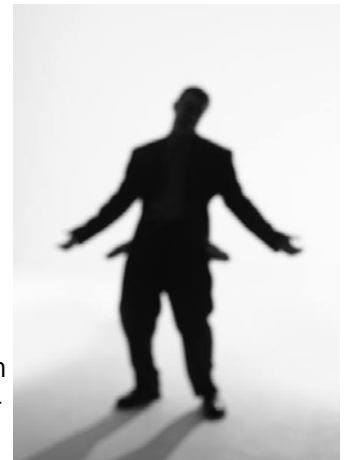

## HURRICANE KATRINA PUTS ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS IN THE SPOTLIGHT

The devastation in the Gulf Coast dramatically brought the issues of poverty and homelessness to the forefront of America's attention. Kansas City responded with a coordinated system of documenting evacuees, providing immediate assistance to these families, and looking for longer-term solutions to these new residents' needs. The Kansas City Helps fundraising effort, the Ewing Marion Kauffman Foundation and other charitable foundations, businesses, and individuals contributed nearly \$650,000 to MAAC for the needs of those left homeless due to Hurricane Katrina. This assistance was in addition to the FEMA, Red Cross, Salvation Army and other immediate disaster programs.



Through MAAC's coordination of assistance resources, the immediate needs of the Gulf Coast evacuees were addressed by our community's network of service providers. MAACLink tracked the changing needs of these families over time and modified the Katrina assistance program based on the changing circumstances as households stabilized into more permanent living situations and began to become a more permanent part of our community.

The original needs for emergency food and lodging soon were replaced by rental deposits and utility assistance. After the initial crisis, families needing assistance were assigned to a case manager who could help set goals and access additional support systems in order to secure employment, additional job training, or education. Our community's coordinated assistance and documentation of services became a model for crisis response.

## LACK OF HEALTH INSURANCE IMPACTS POVERTY

The number of uninsured people climbed by 1.3 million in 2005 to 46.6 million – a record high. The number of children who are uninsured increased for the first

time since 1998 to 8.3 million, or 11.2% of all children

Most low-income children are eligible for either Medicaid or CHIP,

but 20% remain uninsured. 2/3 of the uninsured children have a parent that is working full time throughout the year. (Center on Budget Policy and Priorities)

## PRICE OF HOME HEATING AND POVERTY

According to Fisher, Sheehan & Colton, Missouri households with incomes of below 50% of the Federal Poverty level pay 39.8% of their annual income simply for home energy bills. Actual low-income energy bills exceeded affordable energy bills in Missouri by \$324 million during the 2005 heating season. But Missouri received federal energy assistance funds totaling only \$43 million for

the year. The Missouri Home Energy Affordability Gap has increased 18.9% between 2002 and 2005.

Kansas households with incomes of below 50% of poverty pay 41% of their annual income on home energy bills. Actual low-income energy bills exceeded affordable energy bills in Kansas by \$142 million at 2005 winter fuel prices, but Kansas received only \$15.9 million in

federal energy assistance. The Kansas Home Energy Affordability Gap has increased 15.7% between 2002 and 2005.



## COST OF HOUSING OUT OF REACH FOR MANY

According to the National Low Income Housing Coalition, in order to afford the fair market rent for a two-bedroom apartment in the Kansas City metro area, a minimum wage earner (\$5.15/hour) must work

105 hours per week, 52 weeks per year. Or, a household must include 2.6 minimum wage earners working 40 hours per week year-round to make a two bedroom apartment affordable. Rental assis-

tance is an important part of a low-income household's stability. Often affordable rental housing is energy inefficient and the household also needs gas and electric utility assistance.

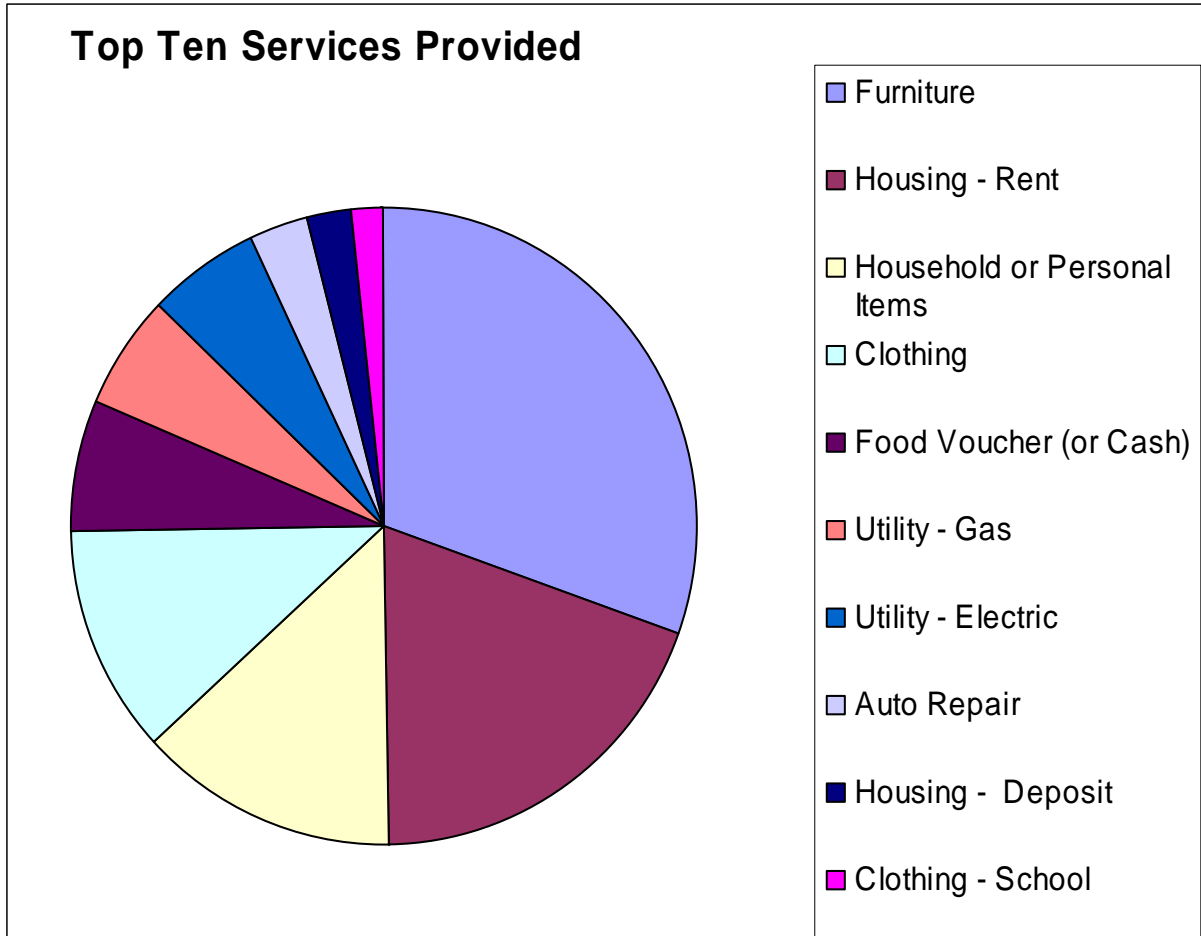
## HOME OWNERSHIP AMONG LOW-INCOME FAMILIES

According to the National Center for Children in Poverty, 48% of low-income children in Kansas live in owner-occupied housing and 42% of low-income Missouri children live in owner-occupied housing. The federal govern-

ment has gradually shifted from targeted rental assistance to promoting low-income homeownership. Homeownership programs have diverted funding from programs for rental assistance such as the Section 8 housing

voucher system. Unfortunately, many low income families receive no tax benefit from home ownership and are likely to live in a home they buy for a relatively short time. Home owners are more likely to receive weatherization assistance, however.

# KATRINA ASSISTANCE FUNDS DISTRIBUTED IN 2005-2006 (KANSAS CITY METRO AREA)



1,976 services totaling \$556,664.75 were provided to 369 households that were displaced because of Hurricane Katrina.

Giving USA reported that individuals and institutions donated an estimated \$260.28 billion in 2005, a 2.7% increase (adjusted for inflation) over the prior year. Giving for disaster relief accounted for about 3% of the total. From December 2004

to October 2005, an estimated \$7.37 billion was donated to address the ravages of natural disasters, with individuals accounting for a majority of the gifts. The American Red Cross received \$2.4 billion to help victims of Hurricane Katrina and the

Salvation Army took in \$363 million in Katrina assistance, more than three times what it raised from its annual Red Kettle campaign.

Without disaster-related philanthropy, charitable giving would have been flat in 2005.

## STRENGTH BASED CASE MANAGEMENT GOALS

The Strength Based Homeless Case Management Program continues to demonstrate that it is an effective way to move families to greater self-sufficiency. MAAC's Strength Based Case management program director trains all case managers working with homeless families and individuals to help the program participants identify their strengths and uses these gifts to achieve their goals. Following is a break-down of the goals that were achieved by Strength Based Case Management program participants in 2005:

MAAC has trained case managers working with homeless individuals and families in the Strength-based approach since 1994. It has proven to be one of the most successful programs for homeless families that are seeking to regain stability.

MAAC's Strength Based Homeless Case Management Coordinator provides initial training in the strength based model and conducts monthly support groups and supplemental training for case managers.

New poverty data documents a trend observed in multiple measures since 2000 – poverty is on the rise in Johnson County. The 2005 estimate for Johnson County residents living below the federal poverty level is almost 27,000 persons or 5.3% of the population.

2005 Poverty Trends Fact Sheet focuses on new American Community Survey (ACS) data released by U.S. Census Bureau on 8/29/06. ACS is an important data tool designed to provide communities with annually updated data on the characteristics of their population and housing.

### From the American Community Survey (U.S. Census Bureau)

The American Community Survey is U.S. Census Bureau data and provides more current data than the 2000 decennial Census. This data allows a more up-to-date picture of a community's demographic, housing, economic and social characteristics. The American Community Survey began in 1996 with data being collected in only a few areas of the country. The program slowly continues to be phased in and 2005 data is now available for Wyandotte County and Kansas City, Kansas.
